





The **ethnicity gap** of high school graduation rates between White and Hispanic students is **4.4%** in 2021-22, with the gap between White and African American students **decreasing** from 23.2% in 2020-21 to **4.6% in 2021-22**.






Educational attainment for Associate, Bachelor, and Graduate/Professional degrees is **higher in Sonoma County than the state and national levels** (2022)

SKILLS GAP

Sonoma County is expected to see a **5.5%** increase in job growth between **2023** and **2028**. To ensure a timely and efficient transition into the workplace, graduates should be equipped with the relevant skills and further efforts should be taken to strengthen the pipeline of local talent.
